Rink Diary Update

As I have said previously, next season, we will stop using the online sign-up sheets and the paper rink booking sheets that we have been using post-Covid. Instead, we will be changing to a new, dedicated, fully online system called 'Rink Diary'.

You will have a unique account to logon with, so that rink booking confirmations and team selections come to you directly. It will also mean that this information will be available to you in one place. I realise that you will have received an email earlier in the season when I started to populate the system with members details. This information will be made available for you again when we start, so there's no need to find that email.

I propose to make access to 'Rink Diary' available to you in the New Year. In that way, you won't start learning to use it then not have the opportunity to use it for real. Look out for email updates in the New Year.

A rough outline of the timetable for rolling this out to everybody, is as follows:

- Between now and Christmas I will be working on the guides and instructions for you to use. I will also be putting together some training that can be done at the club.

- During January and February, I will make the guides and training available

- During this period, I will also be populating the membership and rink booking information
- At the Club's Spring Meeting (in early March) I will remind you that you can start to book friendlies
- During March and onwards into the season, you can then start to sign up for friendlies and book rinks

Training and advice will not stop then. Help and assistance will be available on an ongoing basis for people needing reminders or for new people joining the Club.

Please, do not worry if you think that this is going to stop you booking rinks or signing up for games. It won't. I am going to ensure that there are sufficient people to help everybody. In addition to the guides and instructions, and face to face training sessions, there will be buddies who will be able to show you what to do or, if needed, will even be able to make bookings for you.

Maintenance & Facilities Update

Major Event

Earlier in September the Club took delivery of an additional Shipping Container.

Work had started towards the end of August to prepare the site for the additional container with the team moving the roller store and chemical store after first preparing the ground on the building side of the existing container. Thanks for the help from David Durham. We set out the new site and helped by Geoff Jones, foundations were installed. The existing container then received two coats of paint.

After first purchasing the container, contact was made with the owner of the access field behind the paddock and a delivery was scheduled for the week after the Club Tour. Our plans were then totally changed when the weather forecast predicted heavy rain just before the proposed delivery day and the delivery was brought forward to the previous week. Rapid changes were made to our plans and we were fortunately prepared for the lorry by 8 o'clock on delivery day.

The lorry arrived on schedule and after escorting it through the gates and trees behind the cricket pitch it was very quickly positioned next to the site. In no time at all the container was lifted high in the air and with little ceremony positioned "inch-perfect" on the prepared site. Thanks to Trevor, Ken and Steve for the early start and helping to point their fingers as the highly skilled driver needed little assistance although it might have been different if we hadn't been prepared.

With the completion of stage one of this project we are now underway with the external painting, rebuilding the paddock fence and gates, building a ramp, framing, insulating and lining the inside, installing power and lights and decorating the container to eventually become long-term dry, secure and safe storage. We are planning to complete well before the start of next season.

Business as usual

As well as the storage project, the routine work of the maintenance team will continue and our immediate tasks include preparing the whole site for winter with cleaning drying and storing the gazebos, rationalising and maintaining our outdoor seating and cleaning the gutters and paved areas. Hedge cutting will continue throughout the autumn.

Our planned work for the winter will include a number of repairs to decoration, installing the new IT equipment, enhancements to storage in the cellar, completion of the decorating in the Ladies toilet and redecorating the changing rooms and their toilets. There will be numerous small repair and improvement jobs and always time in the work-plan to have a chat and a cup of coffee.

The maintenance team operates throughout the year on Monday and Friday mornings and work closely with the greenkeeping team to maintain and enhance the Club facilities that make all our activities safe, enjoyable and in keeping with one of the best bowling facilities in the region. Gloucestershire County League Review

This League, otherwise known as the Gloucester Bowls Sunday League, is a 2-rink competition with teams drawn from across the Gloucestershire Bowling Association area. The 2022 season comprised 44 teams from 27 different clubs which were split into 5 divisions with each team playing all the other teams in their respective division once during the season, either home or away. There are no reverse fixtures.

During the last season ODBC had an A Team, managed by Lawrence Oliver in Division 2 and a B Team, managed by Robert Harris in Division 4. The B Team had been promoted from the previous season.

The League commenced in early May with defeats for both of our teams, initially the B Team at home to Avonvale and the A Team away at Bishop's Cleeve A the following week.

However, by the end of the season this had all been turned round so that the A Team finished having won 6 of their 7 matches and the B Team 6 of their 9. A very notable point here is that the A Team won all of their last 3 games by the score of 6 - 0 to finish the season in 2^{nd} place in Division 2 and thereby gain promotion into Division 1 for the 2023 season. The B Team ended the season in a very creditable 4^{th} place in Division 4.

Should the structure of the League in 2023 remain basically the same as 2022, then the A Team will be competing in an extremely strong Division with the top teams from clubs such as Cheltenham, Gloucester City, Frampton and Cam Mills for example forming the opposition.

Green Report – John Arrowsmith

The season started very well when we announced that we were having two open mornings so that members could come along and try their hand at cutting the green. To our surprise seven individuals came along and all were adept at handling the machinery and generally cutting in a straight line. This has meant that I can now call on members to help out when the regular cutters are not available.

Each new season brings along different problems on the green and this year we had two major problems, a leatherjacket infestation and extremely high temperatures. The leatherjackets did cause quite a lot of damage initially but with some judicious treatment the problem was gradually held in check. The left overs can now be seen popping out of the ground as crane flies (daddy long legs). The high temperatures occurred over two longish periods which caused a lot of dry patches over one half of the green. Once they occur it can take a while for the grass to recover even if you get a reasonable amount of rain but the rain was very sparse so the Toro watering system had to be used more than normal. The effect is never as good as natural rain. However, our green was far better than the majority of other greens we played on. Even now the dry patches have not completely gone.

The watering of the green is a perennial bone of contention with some of the players within the club who would like the green to become super-fast. This did occur on a lot of other greens in the surrounding area but only at the expense of the grass seriously dying back. This is not in my remit.

This is the time of year when we do some serious work on the green in an effort to try and improve the behaviour of the green, this is a gradual process. The first action is to scarify the whole area to remove as much thatch as possible. A few weeks ago, we had the levels on the green measured. This shows us where there are high spots and low spots and where there are significant changes in levels we can gradually infill with top dressing for the low areas and hollow tine in the high areas. It is not possible to make the green completely flat because there is too much of a slope from the far side to the clubhouse side of around 50mm (2in). Throughout the winter months we still need to do work on the green, such as the occasionally cut at 8mm, daily removal of worm casts and dew and regularly checking for any deceases.

All members are probably aware that the rink positions are moved three times a week, alternating between away from the clubhouse and across parallel to the clubhouse. In addition, each move requires the rinks to be set up on a different colour position. This means that each rink position is only played on seven or eight times in a season. The reason for this is to reduce wear and stop runs forming. However, there are some rink positions which are used far more than the average. This is generally for the more important team competitions such as the Lloyd trophy, Clarence Davey, Top Club, Inter Club etc. which is reasonable. What I do not consider reasonable is the rinks being turned around for individual outside competitions.

Finally, I must thank all the members who have worked on the green this season they have taken a lot of pressure off me to the extent that all I really do now is supervise and advise.

By the time the next outdoor season starts the 'little red book' Crystal Mark 3rd Edition will be replaced as the review of the Laws of the Sport of Bowls, undertaken at the Biennial WB Council Meeting on 7th August 2022 approved the Crystal Mark Fourth Edition.

If you add up the hours of coaching the team have delivered over the course of the season, it is quite a considerable amount of their time

We have delivered:

- "Bowls What's It All About" A presentation delivered my myself and our National Umpire, Jamie Campbell, on various aspects of the sport, from the structure of bowls, the competitions, rules and etiquette, which was attended by around 40 Members.
- "Back to Basics" This popular session held at the very start of the season to get the delivery back into action, had circa 30 Members take to the Green.
- "4 Week Beginners Course" The course was attended by 28 people new to the sport, of which 23 are now Club Members.
- "Bowls Big Weekend" This National, Bowls England incentive, gave us the opportunity to hold an Open Morning for non-members, where some 17 people turned up to get a taster of the sport. A good proportion of those that attended, are now on the waiting list to join the Club and take up the sport.
- "Development Sessions" Several group sessions have been provided, where requested, to help develop existing players, in various aspects of the sport, from basic delivery analysis, to more technical areas, such as game management, communication, Head Reading, shot play etc.
- > "1-2-1 Coaching" Various individual coaching sessions have been delivered, where requested.
