Maintenance & Facilities Update

Like every bowls season, the maintenance team and others are involved in many routine but essential tasks. These include sweeping up, rubbish/bar waste management, furniture moving, hedge trimming, non-green gardening and many small mending and making tasks to keep the facility safe, available, fully functioning and above all reflecting the ambitions and successes of the Club and its members.

Early in the season we had to replace the water supply pipes to the irrigation tank which did delay some early-season irrigation as, unfortunately, the task proved somewhat bigger than expected. At the same time, we had some repairs to be made to the gazebo covers which delayed their erecting. However, despite some crazy weather in April and May we were able to keep working on some of the long list of projects we had planned. Outside painting has been completed together with some renovation work on the balcony and the cricket nets.

This year has been quite a challenging one for the team when most of the team have been affected by their own frailty or that of a family member, other commitments and even some holidays. However, we keep plodding on, although we must keep pushing more members to step forward to help.

The new storage container is nearing completion and soon we will be able to make full use of a dry, insulated and secure facility. We are determined that it will not be just a dumping ground for old stuff and items for storing will be carefully managed.

As usual during the winter months we will be undertaking maintenance on the benches, repairs to some of the patio chairs and some general maintenance on the equipment shed and other storage places.

A new project is to be started involving preparing space for two new memorial benches on the cricket-nets boundary and erecting timber-built gazebo covers for the seating.

A further "build" project is to be planned to give a covered, secure area outside the cellar.

External Competitions – Ian Gauld

Well, 2023 has proven to be another wonderful year for our members in external competitions. How brilliant too that some of that success has been enjoyed by 'newer' members who have done themselves and the Club proud.

In the **North-East Bristol** competitions, we had a strong representation in the finals with Phil Tellwright, Steve Clark, Dave Lewis & Jiff Roberts (Kevin Shellard sub) reaching their first, and unlikely to be their last, district competition final. Unfortunately, they lost to a strong Redland Green four but the experience will have set them all up for further achievement in the years to come. We had both teams in the mixed fours finals with Jeff Cooper, Jan Lee-Cooper, Ted Mangan & Laura Hunter beating Christine Bradley, Trish Barton, lan Barton & Robert Smith in the Fours. The Bartons also appeared in the final of the mixed pairs where, regrettably, they suffered a second defeat. Victory was always guaranteed in the men's pairs final where a match of high quality finally went the way of Joe Hardwick and Alan Tregoning (also 2021 winners) over lan Curtis and Robert Smith. In the men's triples final our lads, Ian Barton, Tony Iles and Robert Smith, who were the 2022 winners, lost out to a GB Britton triple.

The City & County of Bristol competitions once again saw Olveston achieving strong results. In the fours final Kevin Shellard, Dave Perkins, Ian Curtis, Ken Tudor found themselves up against a strong four from GB Britton and despite some excellent play they lost out. The story was very different though in the Pairs and the Triples finals. Chris Bentley loves this Triples competition and will happily engage with anyone in conversation about it, and this year, along with John Veasey and Robert Smith they made up for their 2022 final defeat, by defeating a Triple from Bristol St. Andrews, achieving Chris's fourth win in the competition. Whilst in the Pairs competition, Joe Hardwick (2015) and Paul Bryant (2004) both achieved their second wins in the competition with another fine win over GB Britton. In the inaugural women's pairs, Christine Bradley and Sue Latham narrowly lost out to a pair from Bristol St. Andrews.

In the **Gloucestershire County** championships and competitions, we had seven representatives in six finals, once again showing our strength at the highest, County, level. The Benevolent Triples (Blake, Barton, Smith) was lost to the holders, the Williamson family, from Cheltenham and the Mixed Pairs also went the wrong way with Sue Latham and Andy Locke pulling back from a slow start but unable to bridge the gap against their opponents from Barnwood. The Senior Fours final saw Mike Humphries, Ken Tudor, Alan Tregoning and Ian Gauld lose out to the last bowl of the last end with Ian's bowl, whilst holding game, removed from the rink by the Frampton skip. The Fours final, for the second time in four years, was contested by two of our own fours and was nip and tuck all the way. The four of Lawrence Oliver, Ian Curtis, Ken Tudor and Alan

Tregoning took an early lead 9-2 after seven ends before Joe Hardwick, John Smallwood, Ian Gauld and Paul Bryant rallied to 9-8 after thirteen ends. By fifteen ends Alan's four were 11-8 up, but Paul's four won the last three ends to eventually win 11-13. Quite how Alan's last bowl went through the gap that it did, we will never know! A total of 24 shots over 18 ends showing just how close the match had been, with twelve singles and only six twos scored. Meanwhile on the other side of the green, the Singles Championship final was taking place, and Robert Smith played some exceptional bowls to be 12-5 up after 10 ends, held off an attempted comeback, and eventually won 21-12. A wonderful victory for Rob who is only the second Olveston member to win the County Singles Championship, Paul Bryant being the other. A magnificent achievement.

In the BE national senior singles, Ken Tudor won four matches and reached the area semi-finals before losing out at Dursley. In the BE national senior pairs, Alan Tregoning and Ian Gauld reached the area quarter-finals where they went out to the eventual area winners from Redland Green. In the BE national mixed pairs, Sue Latham and Andy Locke lost in the area final.

At the National Finals, held at Royal Leamington Spa, in August there was some wonderful support for our fours representatives and those who went along have, I believe, been inspired to emulate them. All of us truly appreciated the support. Whilst the Bryant rink and Rob Smith both me

t defeat in their first matches, Lawrence, Ian C, Ken and Alan won two matches, beating Durham A 19-9 and Dorset B 16-7 before losing out to Northamptonshire A in the last-16 round. A great achievement.

The BE national team events didn't go our way at all this year, in the mixed Tony Allcock our two teams only managed three wins between them, the men's Top Club was lost dismally at Page Park in the first round and after three wins the men's two fours lost, at home, in the area semi-final stage. We can, and should, do better than this.

The Green Report – John Arrowsmith

Each new season brings along different problems on the green and this year we had two major problems, another leatherjacket infestation and myself being unwell which meant that I was not able to be part of the green team until mid-June. The green team showed a lot of enterprise and managed without me and I thank them sincerely for this. The leatherjackets did not cause a lot of damage but it is now becoming an annual problem because there is no efficient way of eradicating them. We had the usual hot temperatures and dry periods which were easily overcome by judicious use of the Toro watering system. The latter part of the season was the opposite with plenty of rain (it always rains during the school holidays). A really heavy downpour will flood the green in a number of areas but once the rain stops then usually the green will be playable within half an hour. For some reason the area in front of the changing rooms was far more susceptible to flooding this year and was also taking much longer to drain. The green was a bit bumpy in places when I did manage to reappear but all that was required was that the hollows causing the bouncing to be filled in with top dressing. I did not manage to start playing again until mid-July and even then I did not play in any away games. However, the feedback I got from some of our players was that our green was far better than the majority of other greens we played on, especially in the Bristol area.

This is the time of year when we do some serious renovation work on the green in an effort to try and improve the behaviour of the green. The first action is to scarify the whole area to remove as much thatch as possible, this should result in a much firmer playing surface. This would normally be followed by top dressing, but top dressing is not considered necessary all the time so this year we will give it a miss and see what the effect is.

Throughout the winter months we still need to do work on the green, such as the occasionally cut at 8mm, daily removal of worm casts and dew and regularly checking for any deceases.

Finally, I must thank all the members who have worked on the green this season they have taken a lot of pressure off me to the extent that all I really do now is supervise and advise. However, we do need at least two more regular cutters and I will try a 'come and try it' morning for anyone interested just before the start of the season.
